### MISSION

234 Intelligence Squadron mission Operationally integrated with the 548th Intelligence Group, providing intel support to theater, joint/combined force and component commanders

- Near-real-time U-2, Global Hawk and Predator imagery
- In-garrison communications operations, computer maintenance, and support functions

Operates \$1B Distributed Ground Station-2 and Deployable Shelterized System-Film components of the Air Force Distributed Common Ground System. Includes exploitation and dissemination of near-real-time U-2, Global Hawk and Predator imagery and signals data to provide actionable, fused all-source intelligence to theater, joint/combined force and component commanders. Supports six unified command operations plans.

The 234<sup>th</sup> has provided command, control, communications and computer support as well as Air Traffic Control services over the years. The unit has participated in numerous missions such as: Joint Forge, Joint Endeavor, Desert Shield, Desert Storm, Operation Enduring Freedom, Southern Watch, Noble Eagle and many others. Additionally, the unit has participated in exercises such as Brim Frost, Cobra Gold, Tandem Thrust, Global Shield, Team Spirit, Ulchi Focus Lens, RSOI, Sentry Vigilance, and many more.

234<sup>th</sup> Intelligence Squadron emblem: On a disc Azure, between two mullets Argent descending palewise, a gauntlet Silver Gray grasping a ring of the like looping the eye of a key ward to base with six lightning flashes radiating from the fist, three to dexter and three to sinister Or; all within a narrow border Yellow. Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "CLAVIS DOMINUS" in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "234TH INTELLIGENCE SQ" in

Yellow letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The iron gauntlet represents the power of intelligence. The lightning flashes allude to combat communications and the three Air Force core values. The key on a ring symbolizes knowledge. The two stars represent the unit's service to state and nation.
