EMBLEM

On a disc Azure, issuant from base a demi-globe Vert gridlined Or, supporting an air traffic control tower Sable and Argent, tower base checky of the last and Gules between in dexter a mullet and in sinister a fleur-de-lis Yellow, all within a diminished bordure Black. Attached above the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "259TH AIR TRAFFIC CONTROL SQ" in Black letters. Attached below the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "CAJUN CONTROL" in Black letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The tower on the globe marked in typical paint pattern, denotes the functions of the unit. The fleur-de-lis suggests the French historical legacy of the home area of the unit. The star represents the expertise of the Squadron's personnel.
