EMBLEM



The 307th Force Support Squadron emblem consists of two elements. Each element highlights the unique heritage of the squadron. The emblem contains a gold hexagonal nut on a blue disc throughout, with a red flash across the center. The emblem has one ribbon at the bottom. The ribbon wording is Air Force Yellow, surrounded by Air Force Blue. At the bottom is printed "307th Force Support Sq." **SIGNIFICANCE:** The emblem is encompassed by a border of yellow with a blue background. These colors allude to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. The nut has six pillars, 3 of which represent the Air Force Core Values, Integrity First, Service before Self, and Excellence in all we do. The other 3 pillars represent the roles we fill when saying the Airmen's Creed. Wingman. Leader. Warrior. The inner circle represents all airmen, it is surrounded by those 6 pillars, ensuring our past, present and future airmen are safeguarded and those values stay true. The red flash represents our ability to respond-strength through support in a moment's notice. (Approved, 12 Dec 1942)
