#### **MISSION**

The 327th Aircraft Sustainment Wing, System Program Managers, organize, direct and control total life-cycle for management of the B-52, KC-135, B-1 and contractor logistics (including tanker, trainer, telemetry, airlift, command & control and US Presidential aircraft) aircraft. The 327 ASW is also responsible for all modifications & sustainment, including management and engineering of systems upgrades, acquisition of new systems, fleet support logistics, software maintenance, and programmed depot maintenance and supporting USAF, Reserve & Guard, sister service and numerous Foreign Military Sales forces. In addition, the 327th ASW System Support Managers, direct and oversee the total system management and readiness of the B-2 and E-3. The 327th ASW also manages and directs 1,400 Air Traffic Control and Landing Systems, and the worldwide High Frequency Global Communications Network.

The 327th Aircraft Sustainment Wing consists of four groups, several squadrons and support organizations. The groups are the 327th Aircraft Sustainment Group, 727th Aircraft Sustainment Group, 747th Aircraft Sustainment Group and the 827th Aircraft Sustainment Group.

#### **EMBLEM**

Azure, above two lightning flashes in saltire Or, six eagle feathers hanging three each from the lower points of the lightning flashes Argent and Gules detailed Silver Gray, the head of Medusa of the third, eyed of the fifth, lips of the fourth, serpents of the like, of the second and of the fifth, all within a diminished bordure Yellow. Attached below the shield, a White scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "327TH AIRCRAFT SUSTAINMENT WING" in Blue letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The Medusa head reflects the Wing's earliest predecessor from 1943, the 327th Fighter Group. Medusa was a female character from Greek mythology whose gaze could turn people into stone and whose hair was made of live venomous snakes. The lightning flashes represent quick reaction capability. The feathers symbolize the Wing's tie to the Oklahoma City Air Logistics Center.

Or, the head of the mythical Gorgon Medusa affronte azure, armed gules. (Approved, 27 Feb 1943. This insigne was replaced 16 May 1958)

### **OPERATIONS**

Became part of the air defense force and also served as an operational training unit, using P-40 until Feb 1943 when they were replaced by P-47. In 1944 began training replacement pilots for combat duty.

July 1 2010, the 327th Aircraft Sustainment Wing became the Oklahoma City Air Logistics Center Aerospace Sustainment Directorate, but while its name changed, its mission stays the same. The result of an Air Force-wide structure realignment decided on in 2009, officials said outside of being named a directorate, there will be little impact and the unit's mission is not affected. "In the transitioning from a wing to a directorate, our mission focus remains the same — provide extraordinary support worldwide to keep 'em flying, modernize and sustain today, and plan for tomorrow," said Col. Mark Beierle, director of the OC-ALC/GK. Manning and contact information will remain the same but it will be mid-August before the organizational modification changing the structure from wing, group, and squadrons to directorate, divisions and branches will be reflected on websites, the Global Address List and signage. In the meantime, various units within the former 327th ASW are hosting inactivation ceremonies to reflect the change, and their coins and flags are being sent to the history office to preserve the heritage of the 327th in the event it should be utilized in the future. The official 327th ASW inactivation ceremony will be held at 3 p.m. today in the base theater.
