EMBLEM

On a silver-gray sector of a circle, point down, within an Air Force blue border, an Air Force blue globe, land areas white, below the constellations Cassiopeia in dexter chief and the Big Dipper in sinister chief, Air Force golden yellow; over all two radar crosshairs, Air Force golden yellow. (Approved, 31 Jul 1959)

MOTTO

"Mareeba Butchers": this nickname came from a Tokyo Rose radio broadcast in which she claimed that the airmen flying out of Mareeba were guilty of intentionally killing innocent women and children. She called the men the "Mareeba Butchers" and the 403rd adopted the nickname as their own.

OPERATIONS

Antisubmarine, Dec 1941-Jan 1942; combat in Southwest and Western Pacific, Oct 1942-12 Aug 1945; not fully manned or equipped, 23 Nov 1945-29 Apr 1946.

On the 15th the 403rd Squadron became the first unit in the Southwest Pacific to lay mines. On that mission 18 mines were dropped from an altitude of 300 feet in the mouth of the Sepik River, in order to obstruct enemy shipping moving up the river to Marienburg, New Guinea.

B-24J 41-47483 of the 403rd Bomb Squadron crashed on a small hill near Leichhardt Creek north of Bluewater Creek (north of Townsville) on 28 March 1944. The aircraft became lost during bad weather associated with a cyclone on a flight from Dobodura in New Guinea to Garbutt airfield.
