## **EMBLEM**



509th Fighter Bomber Squadron Significance The skull represents war, death, and destruction, and is indicative of our capability. The rose represents peace, life, and prosperity, and is indicative of our goal. By our very existence, we fulfill daily our obligations toward our mission. By exercising our capability, we preserve and underwrite our goal.





On a light silver gray disc bordered black, in base a mound of earth, dark gray; imbedded in the earth and lying on its side a white skull, gaping eye sockets, nose and mouth black; springing up

through the upper eye socket and extending over the border in bend, a red rose, stem and leaves green; all outlines and details black throughout. (Approved, 30 Jan 1957)

#### **OPERATIONS**

The unit trained with A-24, P-39 and finally P-47 aircraft. In April of 1944 the unit moved to England and entered combat with the Ninth Air Force. Until D-Day. the 405th was chiefly engaged in the bombing of airfields, marshalling yards and bridges in France in preparation for the invasion of Normandy. The group moved to the continent and continued operations from bases in France and Belgium before returning to the United States in October of 1945 when it was deactivated.

The 509th Fighter Bomber Squadron was activated at Godman Air Force Base, Kentucky in December 1952. The pilots flew F-47's at Godman but a number of them went to Eglin Air Force Base, Florida to check out in the T-33. The squadron moved to Langley Air Force Base, Virginia in April 1953 where it received its first jets - six T-33A's. The summer months were spent getting settled after the move and striving for a maximum of training in the T-33A. In September 1953 the squadron started receiving F-84G's and, by the end of December 1953, had a total of seven. In May 1954, the squadron received its first F-84F, the aircraft that the entire squadron was waiting for since December 1952. Eighteen long months of training and waiting were over. At the end of June 1954, the squadron had a total of eleven F-84F's with more expected in the near future. The 509th Fighter Squadron will soon be combat ready.
