EMBLEM



510 Bombardment Group emblem: On an ultramarine blue disc, border ultramarine blue, piped black, three yellow aerial bombs, one to dexter, one to sinister, pointing to center base point, larger one in center in pale, surmounted by the head and face of a grinning red devil affronte, trimmed black and yellow. (Approved 9 Dec 1943)

510 Strategic Missile Squadron (ICBM-Minuteman) A blue disc edged with a narrow black border on which is a green demi-globe issuing from sinister base with axis bend wise gridlined black below an arced pattern of five white five-pointed stars and a yellow atomic symbol, above the globe a stylized white missile ascending bend sinister, wise emitting three red lightning flashes surmounting the upper portion of the globe. Attached below the disc a blank yellow scroll edged

black. Significance: The missile represents the unit's function, and the atomic symbol its nuclear technology. The three lightning bolts symbolize the missile's speed, power, and strike capability, and the grid and sky are emblematic of the unit's global capability. The five stars represent the unit's World War II participation in five campaigns. Approved: 20 April 1976.

The 510 was unique in that it was the only Minuteman squadron to equip some of its missiles with radio transmitters rather than nuclear warheads. These were intended as a backup system to broadcast the "go-code" to strategic forces in the event of war. The system was called the Emergency Rocket Communications System (ERCS) and, in spite of the stated significance of the lightning flashes, their orientation on the emblem reveals that they actually represent the ERCS radio transmission from the missile. Since not all missiles in the squadron were so-equipped, the atomic symbol was also appropriate to represent the other missiles with nuclear payloads. The Minuteman ERCS mission commenced in October 1967 and was terminated on 1 October 1991, two years before the squadron was inactivated.

Combat in European Theater of Operations (ETO), 14 May 1943-20 Apr 1945.

The 510 SMS is the only squadron in the Air Force operating the Emergency Rocket Communications System (ERCS). ERCS is a missile-based method for ensuring communication among all SAC's forces in a wartime environment. ERCS, which is in addition to the squadron's traditional nuclear capabilities, was added to the squadron's responsibilities on Aug. 29, 1967. ERCS crew members are expected to maintain proficiency in both traditional Emergency War Order and weapon-system operating practices and in ERCS procedures—a dual responsibility that makes 510 SMS personnel the only line crew members qualified to pull alerts anywhere in the wing.

ERCS is not the squadron's only unique feature. Oscar-01, the 510 SMS Command Post, is the only operational launch control facility actually on an Air Force base. With that unique location come thousands of visitors each year—among them top-ranking government officials, celebrities, and the first Soviet military delegation ever to visit Whiteman.

510 SMS became fully operational on June 30, 1964.
