### EMBLEM



On an ultramarine azure disc, a vert globe highlighted with light vert longitude and latitude lines is positioned at fess point. An air force or and bronze elongated hollow diamond (faux lozenge) encases the globe while tilting sinister. Two olive branches encircle the charges as they pass through the corners of the diamond. The disc is bordered with sable. Two argent scrolls are attached above and beneath the disc. The scrolls are also bordered with sable. The scroll above is blank. The one beneath is lettered with sable and bears the unit's motto "peace through strength." **SIGNIFICANCE:** ultramarine blue and air force yellow are used in the design. Blue represents the sky, the primary theater of air force operations. Yellow signifies the sun and the excellence required of air force personnel. The faux lozenge delta is symbolic of a link of a coat of mail and the strength of defense. The four sides denote the four state area of personnel recruitment. The globe represents the global mission of the gaining command. The encircling olive branches symbolize he desire for peace. (Approved, 17 May 1991)
