EMBLEM



On a disc Gules, a globe Azure gridlined Or issuant from sinister chief and perched upon the globe a crouching and snarling tiger facing to dexter with sinister claw extended bend sinisterwise Proper, all within a narrow border Black. Attached below the disk, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "535TH AIRLIFT SQUADRON" in Black letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The globe symbolizes the worldwide commitments of the 15th Airlift Wing. The ferocious tiger represents the 535th Airlift Squadron as a unique unit in the Pacific theater. (Approved, 11 Jun 1968)

Replacement crew, advanced flying, and basic flying training, Dec 1943-Apr 1944.

On activation in 1967, took over C-7A aircraft of 57 Aviation Company (USA) and tactical airlift mission in South Vietnam. Operated from several locations in addition to its primary base. Airlifted routine cargo and passengers, provided support for Army special forces and radio relay for ground units, airdropped troops and cargo, performed emergency resupply and medical evacuations, and flew other combat airlift missions. Last mission flown the day of inactivation.

The first USAF C-7 Caribou lost to enemy action was shot down by VC ground fire while on a resupply flight. A single bullet severed a fuel manifold causing the engines to stop through fuel starvation. The pilot crash-landed the Caribou in a rice paddy near Binh Thuy and all the crew escaped.

Earned a Navy PUC, as well as PUC combat device for airlift support of Khe Sanh and other forward bases from Jan to May 1968. Earned a second PUC between Apr and Jun 1970 for participation in aerial resupply of Dak Seang Special Forces Camp, evacuation of over 2000 refugees from Cambodia, and transportation of the Presidential Southeast Asia Investigation Team to various remote locations in South Vietnam.

One C-17 from Hickam AFB, Hawaii, and a second Globemaster III from Elmendorf AFB, Alaska, delivered about 226,000 pounds of humanitarian supplies to Shanghai, China, on Feb. 8. The US sent the supplies after severe winter storms hit 19 of China's provinces. 2008

C-17 Drops Special Ops Boat Over Pacific: Members of the 535th Airlift Squadron from JB Pearl Harbor-Hickam, Hawaii, joined forces with the Navy's Special Warfare Unit One from Guam to drop a 19,000-pound, rigid-hull inflatable boat from the back of a C-17 transport. Airmen utilized the maritime craft aerial delivery system, or MCADS, to dispense the boat during the January drill. "With today's military going joint, it is essential that we merge our technologies and capabilities," said SMSgt. Chuck Baker, plans and programs superintendent and airdrop loadmaster with Hickam's 15th Wing. He added, "Each branch has their own specialties, but we need each other to make the overall mission a success. This is why the training in Guam was so important." MCADS is designed to enable covert delivery of the specially designed boat without detection by enemy sensors or patrols. 2011.
