On a light blue disc, bordered Air Force yellow, the symbols of a clock, indicated with Roman numerals, III, VI, IX, and XII black, the hands of the clock pointing toward the XII, over all a cubit winged arm proper, trusting the clenched fist through a cloud proper, gripping and shattering the fuselage of a supersonic bomber black. OPERATIONS

The 539th, in conjunction with the 538th Fighter Squadron, operated under the Replacement Training Unit (RTU) program in the advance phase of pilot training.

The 539th Fighter Interceptor Squadron was activated in October 1943 at Westover Field, Chicopee, Mass. Shortly after activation, the squadron moved to Seymour Johnson Field, Goldsboro, North Carolina to become part of the 402nd Fighter Group where it operated under the Replacement Training Unit Program of the advanced phase of pilot training. In December 1943, the squadron again moved, this time to Blethenthal Field, Wilmington, North Carolina, and was assigned to the 326th Fighter Group where it remained until disbanded in April 1944.

In April 1954, the squadron was assigned to Air Defense Command and reactivated at Stewart Air Force Base, Newburgh, New York, equipped with F-94C aircraft. The reactivated designation of the unit was the 5th Fighter Interceptor Squadron. In August 1955, however, after a move to McGuire Air Force Base, New Jersey, the unit was redesignated the 539th Fighter Interceptor Squadron.

While at McGuire AFB, the squadron was equipped initially with F-86D type aircraft, and later with the F-86L all-weather interceptor. The 539th was one of two combat units in Air Defense Command at McGuire AFB to operate under the control of the nation's first semi-automatic ground environment system (SAGE) which became operational in mid-1958 in the vital New York-Philadelphia area.

The 539th is the first squadron in Air Defense Command to be equipped with the F-106A, supersonic interceptor.

16 October 1972 A USAF Convair F-106B-50-CO Delta Dart, 57-2528, of the 4756th Air Defense Wing, Tyndall AFB, Florida, is lost in a crash. This aircraft had survived a mid-air collision on 4 May 1965 with F-106A-80-CO, 57-4721, both assigned to the 539th Fighter-Interceptor Squadron, McGuire AFB, New Jersey, the second fighter being lost and 2528 recovering to NAFEC Atlantic City, New Jersey.
