602nd Special Operations Squadron emblems: Over and through a light turquoise blue disc, a caricatured, brown eagle with yellow beak and feet, diving through space toward dexter base, wearing a GI helmet with orange straps, holding a commando knife, proper, in the beak, and grasping and firing a black "tommy" gun held in the talons, all emitting speed lines to rear. (Approved 3 Aug 1945)

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NICKNAME

OPERATIONS

602nd Special Operations Squadron (Fire Fly)- This unit flew the same types of missions as did the 23rd Tactical Air Support Squadron and the 22nd. Special Operations Squadron. The three units rotated between U.S. Elements operating in Laos. Missions consisted of close air support, direct air strikes and search and rescue. The A1 Douglas Skyraider was used for these missions.

In August 1965, to meet the needs of rescue escort over northern Laos and North Vietnam, the 602d Fighter Squadron (Commando) rotated its A-IEs from Bien Hoa to Udorn. Two TAC CH-3Es had, meanwhile, arrived at Nakhon Phanom on July 5, and two HH-43Bs moved up from the Mekong River town to Udorn where they were joined by two factory-fresh HH-43Fs. The addition of the A-IEs meant that with the HC-54s in place, and the HU-16s operating out of Da Nang to cover the water rescue mission, a full search and rescue task force was in Southeast Asia. Over the years equipment improved and aircraft changed but the search and rescue task force of 1965 closely resembled that of 1973 in doctrine, tactics, and procedures.

December 1970, the 602 SOS with 33 A-1H/J aircraft inactivated and its assets transferred to the 1 SOS at Nakhon Phanom.
