## Decorations

### EMBLEM

Sable, in dexter a unicorn's head couped and contoured Azure detailed and fimbriated Or, in sinister base, a caduceus Gules below a bald eagle's head erased Proper. Attached above the disc a Black scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed " 622nd AEROMED EVAC SQ " in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc a Black scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed " GLOBAL RESPONSE " in Yellow letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The black background denotes the unit's round-the-clock response capabilities. The mythical unicorn, with its alleged magical powers, is symbolic of healing. The caduceus, an international symbol of health services, denotes the squadron members' dedication, loyalty and courage in providing patient care and life saving transportation to the global mission of the United States Air Force. The eagle represents the unit's dedication to freedom and its swift and accurate aeromedical evacuation response time. (Approved, 10 Mar 1998)
