EMBLEM

On a disc per pile Azure and Gules, issuant from base a globe Sable gridlined Argent, issuant from chief per pile two lightning flashes point to top of the globe Or, the pile charged with a shovel in pale handle to chief surmounting a hammer and fire axe in saltire of the third; all within a narrow border Yellow. Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "LEAD THE WAY" in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "633D CIVIL ENGINEER SQUADRON" in Yellow letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. Lightning bolts represent the traditional symbol of Air Force might and tie the Squadron emblem to the 633d Air Base Wing emblem. The globe represents both the global reach of the Squadron mission and the global locations in which the Squadron has served. The trisecting hammer, shovel, and fire axe are representative of the tools used by 633 Engineers in completion of their duties. The shovel and hammer represent the Squadron's horizontal and vertical construction capability while the fire axe represents the Squadron's emergency services capabilities.
