Over and through a yellow orange disc, border light turquoise blue, a caricatured gray and white kangaroo, leaping over blue green trees and green grass in base, wearing dark red boxing gloves, light red aviator's helmet, white goggles, and carrying in the pouch two caricatured baby kangaroos, wearing light red aviator's helmets and white goggles, one to dexter grasping a "stick" in the left hand, and holding aloft in the right hand a light turquoise blue aerial bomb, small kangaroo to sinister holding and aiming a black aerial machine gun.
