Combat in ETO, 5 Feb 1944-21 Apr 1945. Combat in Korea, 2 Nov 1950-9 May 1952. Airlifted personnel and cargo worldwide, 1960-. Missions also included humanitarian relief, aeromedical flights, and airdrops of supplies and paratroopers.

24 August 1950 Two B-26 Invaders of the 729th Bombardment Squadron (Light), 452d Bombardment Group (Light), based at George AFB, California, collide in flight over El Mirage Dry Lake, 10 miles NW of Victorville, California. B-26B, 44-34174, piloted by Ouris H. Cuerton, and B-26B, 44-34677, piloted by Lyle N. Leavitt, both crash with crew fatalities during attempted bail-outs.

26 August 2011 - A 15-person Air Force Reserve crew from the 729th Airlift Squadron, 452nd Air Mobility Wing, March ARB, California, retrieved Delta II rocket debris in Mongolia. The rocket had been launched in early 2011 and retrieval mandatory under the Outer Space Treaty of 1967 and the Rescue and Return Treaty of 1968. The Reservists loaded the rocket debris onto their C-17 aircraft upon arriving at Chinngis Khan International Airport, Mongolia. The debris included a second-stage fuel tank and two spheres that were filled with hydrogen gas. The Reservists delivered the debris to the Space and Missile Systems Center at Los Angeles AFB, California, for further study.15
