633 Air Mobility Support Squadron emblem: On a disc Azure, issuant from dexter base a demi globe Vert gridlined Azure supporting a torii gate bendwise sinister Gules, in sinister a flight symbol ascending palewise of the last emitting a diminishing contrail arcing to sinister base Or, between in dexter a flight symbol Red ascending bendwise emitting a diminishing contrail arcing to sinister base Yellow, and in chief a bezant, all within a diminished border Black. Attached above the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "633 AMSS" in Black letters. Attached below the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed

"ENROUTE PACESETTERS" in Black letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The globe indicates the Squadron's support to the Air Mobility Command's worldwide mission for airlift support. The torii gate signifies the command's presence and commitment to the Orient. The bezant suggests the moon, and the flight symbols outside the earth's atmosphere symbolize present and future endeavors in support of airlift requirements.
