EMBLEM

On a disc Azure, issuant from base a demi-globe of the field, gridlined Argent, surmounted by an American bald eagle stooping Proper, lifting in its talons a cross Gules, all within a narrow border Or. Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "BRINGING THEM HOME" in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "775 EAES" in Yellow letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The American bald eagle, as the national bird of the United States, symbolizes strength and freedom. The red cross represents the medical and support professionals tasked with the transportation and care of wounded warriors. The globe denotes the global capability of the unit whose primary mission is to evacuate the wounded from the battlefield to a military airfield closest to home base. "Bringing Them Home," the unit motto, emphasizes the mission. (Approved, 23 Jul 2007)
