OPERATIONS

Combat MTO ETO, 30 Apr 1944-26 Apr 1945.

Combat operations in Mediterranean and European Theaters of operation, Feb 1944-May 1945. Moved to Trinidad in Jun 1945 and inactivated on 31 Jul 1945. Served briefly in South Vietnam, July 1963. Activated as a Troop Carrier Squadron and in Apr 1964 carried the casket and body of General Douglas MacArthur from Washington, DC, to Norfolk, Virginia, for burial. In Nov and Dec 1964 participated in operation "Dragon Rouge", evacuating refugees of civil war from the Congo. In Mar 1965, participated in Operation Steep Hill to protect Alabama citizens during civil rights demonstrations. Rotated crews in and out of Southeast Asia and the Congo in 1965 and participated in humanitarian airlift during revolutionary crisis in the Dominican Republic. Moved to Japan in Dec 1965 and conducted combat airlift into Vietnam, transporting troops, equipment, and supplies to various bases in Southeast Asia, including resupply operations to Khe Sanh and the A Shau Valley during the first half of 1968. Crews rotated to Cam Ranh Bay and Tan Son Nhut to fly shuttle missions. As Saigon fell in Apr 1975, airlifted Vietnamese orphans from the city during Operation Baby Lift.

The initial Hercules was commanded by Maj. Robert F. Wallace of the 776th Squadron. Major Wallace made the planned run-in, raising considerable tracer fire near the drop zone and taking damage in the rudder area, but releasing the load. After talking by radio with the airborne forward air controller on the scene, the second crew decided to approach from a different direction in the hope of taking the enemy by surprise. Heavy haze made it difficult to spot the soccer field, and the crew turned off for a second try. On the second run, thirty seconds from the release point, the enemy let loose, saturating the air over the drop zone using barrage techniques. Hits penetrated the cargo compartment and cracked the pilot's windscreen. Machine gun fire killed, the flight engineer and wounded the navigator and copilot. The cargo (155-mm howitzer and 81-mm mortar ammunition) smoldered in intense heat from a ruptured hot-air line. The loadmasters jettisoned the ammunition and fought recurrent flames with hand extinguishers. With two engines out and the landing gear manually lowered, the crew nursed the plane back to Tan Son Nhut. For saving the aircraft and their wounded crewmates, Capt. William R. Caldwell and SSgt Charles L. Shaub, both of the 776th Squadron, earned Air Force Crosses. U.S. Army officers reported that, as could best be ascertained, of the twenty-six tons dropped by the two C-I 30s on April 15 nothing was recovered by the defenders."

During the early 1970s the 776 TAS carried out missions all over Pacific area, including Taiwan, Vietnam, Thailand, Japan, Korea and many other countries. Missions were also flown to many of the islands in the Pacific. All types of cargo was transported. Although much of the cargo was general, fuel and explosives were also hauled. Passengers were transported and medical patients were evacuated to hospital facilities. Passenger missions often included foreign nationals and sometimes prisoners of war. The C130s were often used to transport those killed in action from remote airfields to the larger air bases. In times when a defensive position was surrounded and no supplies could get in, the C130s would fly through heavy anti-aircraft and ground fire to drop needed supplies to the friendlies on the ground.

During 1970 and 1971 the 776 TAS was operating out of CCK, Taiwan with Det 1 at Ton Son Nhut, Vietnam and Det 2 at U-Tapao, Thailand. Crews were rotated to the detachments on a TDY basis. There was also a shuttle operating out of Bangkok, Thailand. As the U.S. involvement in the war began to wind down, Det 1 in Ton Sun Nhut was closed down and the 776 crews began operations out of Nakhon Phanom, Thailand. Missions were still being flown into Vietnam, but no [U.S.] C-130 crews were assigned TDY to Vietnam.
