EMBLEM



2162 Communications Squadron emblem **SIGNIFICANCE**: Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow signifies the sun and the excellence of Air Force

personnel. The green mountains and blue sky represent the solid ground which the unit ensures and the far reaching aspect of the mission in space. The red satellite and dish with the lightning bolts symbolize the means by which the unit provides information. The three white stars represent CINCNORAD, CINCSAC, and the National Command authorities which the 2162 Communications Squadron supports.





802 Communications Squadron emblem: On a disc Azure, between in chief four mullets enarched from sinister to dexter, the one in sinister chief a polestar all Argent, and in base a mountain range ascending to dexter Vert, a lightning bolt arching from sinister to dexter Or; all within a narrow border Yellow. Attached above the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Blue border and inscribed "NO MISSION IMPOSSIBLE" in Blue letters. Attached below the disc, a Yellow scroll edged with a narrow Blue border and inscribed "802D COMMUNICATIONS SQ" in Blue letters. SIGNIFICANCE: Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The lightning bolt represents new technology, instant communications and its arc from top to bottom shows the vast capabilities the unit provides from ground to air. The hills and ground are the foundation the unit plants itself on as it reaches for greatness. The stars serve as a reminder that it is the unit's duty to reach higher and strive to

achieve more. Totally, the emblem recognizes the history of the Squadron and its connection to Joint Base San Antonio. Adapting the historical emblem, the design recognizes past and present circumstances of the Squadron. Working now with high-speed data and voice communications, the purpose of sharing information has always been to communicate the mission. The 802d Communications Squadron will continue to be on the cutting edge of communications as described in the motto, "NO MISSION IMPOSSIBLE." (Approved, 26 Aug 1988)
