#### **EMBLEM**

On a disc per fess Azure and Vert, a target of rings overall Gules charged with a lightning bolt in pale point to base Or, surmounted by a pair of swords in saltire points to base Argent, hilted Sable, all within a narrow border Red. Attached above the disc, a Silver Gray scroll edged with a narrow Red border and inscribed "VAE VICTIS" in Red letters. Attached below the disc, a Silver Gray scroll edged with a narrow Red border and inscribed "817TH EXP AIR SUPPORT OPS SQ" in Red letters. SIGNIFICANCE: Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The divided field represents the unit's role in air-to-ground operations. The sword signifies the determination with which unit members direct air strikes. The lightning flash denotes the dissemination of critical information upon which hinges mission success. The target rings symbolize courage displayed by unit members while confronting the enemy.
