EMBLEM

On a disc Azure, a mullet Celeste as a globe landmasses Or, grid lines of the first, within a triple border of the last, Argent, and Gules, emitting five lightning bolts as on a compass, one each to North East, South East, South, South West and North East of the third, all within a narrow bordure Yellow. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "902D COMMUNICATIONS SQ" in Yellow letters. **SIGNIFICANCE**: Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The star signifies a beacon that reaches out to the base populace and beyond. The tri-color outline of the star represents our National colors and denotes purity, innocence, hardiness, valor, vigilance, perseverance and justice. The gridlined globe symbolizes the global grid the unit has a part in maintaining, deploying and securing. The lightning bolts represent the services provided by the Squadron: network operations, telecommunications, knowledge operations, airfield systems and information assurance.
