EMBLEM



Or, a globe of the like gridlined Sable bearing an eagle displayed grasping in its dexter talons an olive branch and in its sinister talons a Caduceus Argent and charged on its breast with a plate bearing a cross couped Gules; all within a diminished inner bordure Azure and a diminished outer bordure Yellow. Attached above the disc a Black scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border. Attached below the disc a Black scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "JUST CALL 911" in Yellow letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The globe denotes that the unit is ready to provide its services anywhere in the world. The eagle reflects the support provided by the Squadron's parent unit to national defense. The eagle grasps an olive branch and Caduceus signifying the humanitarian nature of the unit's work. The red cross on the disc reflects all facets of the medical community within the squadron.
