EMBLEM

On a blue disc within a narrow yellow border, between two red lightning flashes, a white parachute with black shroud lines surmounted in the vertical center by a black rod with two yellow wings and entwined by two yellow serpents. Below the disc a blank white scroll edged black. **SIGNIFICANCE**: The circular field alludes to all around proficiency in every phase of Aviation Medicine. The parachute is significant of the active supporting role of a Troop Carrier Group. The Caduceus is derived from the symbol of the healing arts to which the squadron is proudly dedicated. The lightning flashes represent the speed with which the squadron operates in any medical contingency. (Approved, 2 Dec 1963)



On a disc Azure, between two lightning flashes chevronwise Gules, an open parachute Argent

surmounted palewise by a Rod of Asclepius Sable wings and snakes Or; all within a narrow Yellow border. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "911TH AEROMED STAGING SQ" in Yellow letters. Significance: Ultramarine Blue and Air Force Yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The circular field alludes to all around proficiency in every phase of Aviation Medicine. The parachute signifies the active supporting role of a Troop Carrier Group. The Rod of Asclepius is derived from the traditional symbols of healing arts. The lightning flashes represent the speed with which the Squadron operates in any medical contingency. (Approved, 9 Dec 2022)
