EMBLEM



On a sable disc, a gules cross centered and occupies all positions on the disc. An eight pointed or estoile is surmounted on the cross at dexter chief. An ultramarine azure winged caduceus is superimposed on the cross sinister base. The disc is bordered with sable. An argent scroll is attached above and below the disc. The scrolls are also bordered with sable. The scroll above is blank. The one below is lettered with sable and bears the unit's motto "PARVA LUX IN TENEBRIS." **SIGNIFICANCE:** ultramarine blue and air force yellow are used in the design. Blue represents the sky, the primary theater of air force operations yellow signifies the sun and nrm excellence required of air force personnel. The eight pointed Air Force yellow star also depicts light and life, even in the darkest hour. The red cross, an international symbol for medical aid, represents the blood of life and qualities of courage and compassion. The winged caduceus, symbolizes the professional medical skills, the flying mission and mission support. The black field, emblem border and lettering on a field of white, denote darkness and the determination of unit personnel to provide quality medical care. (Approved, 17 Jan 1996)
