MISSION

The wing's mission is to fly C-130H cargo aircraft, both airdropping and airlanding cargo and people. Aeromedical evacuation of patients within the theater of operations is another facet of the mission. The 934 Airlift Wing supports the Air Force mission on a daily basis, providing airlift both in the United States and around the world. Upon mobilization orders, the 934 Airlift Wing would deploy to become part of the active duty Air Force's Air Mobility Command.

To accomplish its mission, the 934 Airlift Wing is made up of 14 units, including a headquarters section. They are: the 96th Airlift Squadron, 934 Aeromedical Evacuation Squadron, 27th Aerial Port Squadron, 934 Civil Engineer Squadron, 934 Logistics Readiness Squadron, 934 Aircraft Maintenance Squadron, 934 Maintenance Squadron, 934 Aeromedical Staging Squadron, 934 Services Squadron, 934 Communications Flight, 934 Maintenance Operations Flight, 934 Mission Support Flight and 934 Operations Support Flight.

Parted per fess gules and azure, overall a pile issuant from sinister throughout argent, between in chief a helmeted viking head couped, descending to dexter flank of the last garnished gray, helmet counter-changed and in base nine mullets ascending to dexter flank in three alternating rows of three, four and two or, charged with three silhouetted stylized aircraft fesswise in flight formation to dexter of the fourth, all within diminished bordure of the last. Significance. The emblem is symbolic of the group and its mission. The viking head alludes to strength and bravery and refers to the northern location of Minnesota, the state where the unit is stationed. The aircraft in flight and the background of white and the star studded deep blue depict the day and night airlift capability. The emblem bears the Air Force colors, golden yellow and ultramarine blue and the national colors, red, white, and blue. (Approved, 23 Oct 1964)

OPERATIONS

Provided worldwide airlift and airdrops of passengers and materiel, 1963-. Periodically deployed to Panama, and later Puerto Rico, to fly cargo and personnel throughout Central and South America, 1979-. Deployed personnel and aircraft to participate in allied operations in the Gulf area and the Balkans, 1990 and later. Participated in numerous joint airborne training exercises and humanitarian airlifts.

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A C-130 aircrew of the 934th Tactical Airlift Group got its year off to a good start when they helped rescue four people on January 12. The four were adrift in a 14-foot aluminum boat after their outboard motor failed. The Reservists, whose home base is Minneapolis St. Paul IAP, Minn., were on rotational duty at Howard AFB, Panama, when alerted to the emergency. They located the boat about 90 miles west of San Jose Costa Rica, and directed a Panamanian cargo vessel to the site for the pickup. The C-130 crew consisted of Capts. Norman A. Rice, Richard W. Curry and George W. Bereza; MSgts. Robert A. Otto and Larry Elit; and, SSgt. Terrence O'Shea

The 934th Airlift Wing, based at Minneapolis-St. Paul IAP/ARS, Minn., prepared 44,000 pounds of humanitarian supplies, which were then flown to Paraguay by a C-5 Galaxy from the 433d AW, Kelly AFB, Tex. In another relief effort, a C-130 Hercules from the 911th Airlift Wing, Pittsburgh IAP/ARS, Pa.,flew 30,000 pounds of supplies to Haiti. Both flights fell under the Denton Amendment, which allows DoD organizations to transport relief supplies on a space-available basis without charge to the donor or receiver.

15 MarCold Response 2020 Exercise, Andoya AB, Norway, is complete. 934 AW deployed 52 operations and maintenance personnel and (2) C-130H3 aircraft to this effort. Objectives were to conduct multi-national joint exercises with a high-intensity combat scenarios in extreme winter conditions. 934 AW conducted 41 sorties as part of this exercise for a total of 103 flight hours.

4 Sep Silver Arrow Exercise complete in Ramstein AB, Germany. 934 AW provided a 3-ship package for this three week exercise where the effectiveness of AFRC C-130H aircraft were assessed, while performing with degraded/denied GPS, degraded/denied communications, in contested European airspace concurrent with a real-time intelligence scenario. Distributed operations were also tested due to COVID-19 mitigation.

In January of 1970, the first C-130 Hercules cargo transport aircraft were delivered to the 934th Airlift Group. Total aircraft assigned is nine. The present aircraft, built by Lockheed Corporation, are E-model C-130 aircraft flown by reservists of the 96th Airlift Squadron and maintained by reservists of the 934th Maintenance Squadron. History The Air Force Reserve has had active units at the Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport since 1949. In June 1970, the 934th moved to its present location on the north side of the airport. The 934th was activated on February 11, 1963, at Minneapolis-St. Paul IAP. Before that time it was called the 934th Troop Carrier Group, which had a materiel squadron, a combat support squadron and the 96th Troop Carrier Squadron. The group was under the 440th Troop Carrier Wing, headquartered at Milwaukee, Wise. The 96th Squadron has served under the designations of troop carrier, fighter-bomber and airlift squadron since it was constituted on May 25, 1943, at Baier AAF, Ind.

On April 1, 1978, the 934th was placed under the command of the 442nd Tactical Airlift Wing, Richards-Gebaur, Mo. On Oct. 1, 1981, the 934th was transferred to the 433rd Tactical Airlift Wing, Kelly AFB, Texas. On April 1, 1985, the 934th was placed under the command of the 302nd Tactical Airlift Wing, Peterson AFB, Colo. On Dec. 31, 1987, the 934th was placed under the command of the 403rd Tactical Airlift Wing, Keesler AFB, Miss. The 934th was placed under its present command June 1, 1992.

The 934th has been actively involved in support of the Air Force mission over the last two decades. The group participated for nearly five months in 1992 in Operation Provide Promise, the United Nations humanitarian airlift into Bosnia-Herzegovina, and continued rotations there in 1993 and 1994. Aircraft and personnel from the 934th deploy to Operation Coronet Oak in Panama on a regular basis. Members of the 934th were involved in Operation Just Cause in Panama in 1989 and Operation Restore Hope in Somalia in 1993.

The 934th had both personnel and aircraft mobilized and deployed for Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm. Aircrew, aeromedical, aircraft maintenance, medical squadron, aerial port and support personnel deployed to the Persian Gulf, England, Spain and other parts of the United States in 1990 and 1991.
