EMBLEM



10 Bombardment Squadron (Heavy) emblem approved, 27 Sep 1940



10 Strategic Missile Squadron (ICBM-Minuteman) emblem: On an AF blue disc bordered AF golden yellow, an AF golden yellow lion rampant, shaded golden brown, his tongue red, emerging from a hole, dark brown rimmed red; five red lightning flashes radiating upward from the hole, fimbriated white. Motto: On a white scroll edged and inscribed AF blue, THE FIRST ACE IN THE HOLE. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Against a background of ultramarine blue To represent the sky and bordered AF golden yellow to display the Air Force colors, a lion, retained from the former emblem emerges from a hole as a symbol of the unit's "Ace in the Hole." The lion, representing the unit's force and striking power, directs and controls the launch operations of

the five lightning bolts, symbolizing the five flights of missiles for which the squadron is responsible, and their quick reaction capability. The red rim around the emplacement indicates security of the weapon and signals danger to unauthorized intrusion. (Approved, 21 Jun 1963)





10 Missile Squadron emblem: an Air Force Blue disc, an Air Force Golden Yellow demi lion rampant, shaded Golden Brown, his tongue Red, emerging from a hole, Dark Brown, rimmed Red; fimbriated White five red lightning flashes radiating upward from the hole, fimbriated White. The moon and star are celestial bodies used in long-range flights where accurate navigation is essential. The lion and bomb represent the force and striking power of a heavy bombardment unit."
