EMBLEM



The unit's original heraldry dated to 1956 and featured a cartoon-like character whom squadron members called "hatchet man."

17 Engineer Squadron emblem: Air Force yellow signifies the excellence required of Air Force personnel. Air Force blue signifies the sky as the primary theater for Air Force operations. Silver signifies the perseverance all Air Force personnel must possess. The lightning bolts represent the constant state of readiness 17th Civil Engineer Squadron personnel are in, ready to do the job wherever and whenever. The group of tools represents the tools of the 17th Civil Engineer Squadron craftsmen who are building, maintaining, and protecting the Air Force's finest facilities.
