# **EMBLEM**

The ultramarine blue and yellow are colors commonly used in Air Force heraldry. Blue represents the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow is symbolic of the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The globe, predominately blue with small patches of green signifies the Pacific Basin, the unit's area of responsibility. The rainbow—a frequent, natural

phenomenon at the home of the squadron and its operations locations—depicts the dissemination of information. The clasping hands denote the working relationship between the Air National Guard and the active-duty components of the United States Air Force. The lightning bolt signifies communications and air traffic control which are the primary mission of the squadron.
