EMBLEM



22nd Strategic Aerospace Division emblem: Per bend light blue and azure four lightning flashes, two in bend issuant from dexter chief and sinister base, two issuant from sinister chief all or garnished gules, overall in dexter chief an aircraft fesswise argent in dexter flank a missile palewise of the like emitting a vapor trail to base of the fourth fimbriated of the fifth, in sinister base a globe arraswise of the last grid lined of the second with land areas vert above an arched olive branch of the last, all within a diminished bordure of the third. (Approved, 6 Jun 1963)

OPERATIONS

The 22d Wing replaced an operational training unit at Hunter Field, Georgia on 5 Dec 1942 and began supervising and coordinating various aspects of dive bombardment training for subordinate groups. It moved to Florida in Feb 1943 and continued training until 15 Aug 1943. Reestablished in Jul 1959 and later redesignated 22d Strategic Aerospace Division, it assured that assigned units were organized, manned, trained, and equipped to conduct air refueling operations and long-range strategic bombardment using either nuclear or conventional weapons. In addition, from 1962 to 1965 the division controlled Atlas ICBM's.
