27 Mobile Aerial Port Squadron emblem: On an ultramarine blue disc, a green globe grid lined white issuing from base, surmounted by a brown crate bound white and suspended from a scarlet parachute with white shroud lines charged with a yellow Viking head in profile; and a

yellow polestar at lower left; all within a narrow ultramarine blue border. Attached above the disc a white scroll edged with a narrow ultramarine blue border. Attached below the disc a white scroll edged with a narrow ultramarine blue border inscribed WORLD WIDE MOBILITY in ultramarine blue letters. **SIGNIFICANCE**: Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater for Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The North Star and Viking are emblems associated with Minnesota the location of the unit. The parachute and cargo symbolize the mission of the unit. The globe represents the worldwide mobility of the 27th Mobile Aerial Port Squadron. (Approved, 11 Dec 1987)







27 Aerial Port Squadron emblem: Azure, issuant from dexter bas a demi-globe Vert bendwise gridlined Argent (Silver Gray) edged Sable, in sinister a stylized eagle of the third detailed of the fourth and charged with a mullet of the same pierced Gules, in dexter chief a pole star Or detailed Sable, all within a dimished bordure of the last. **SIGNIFICANCE**: Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The pole star is a symbol of navigation. The eagle reflects pride and flexibility of mission while the star with a red center symbolizes the rich tradition of the Air Force. The globe refers to the scope of the unit's

OPERATIONS

In CY 2020 the 27th APS participated in a humanitarian mission, as part of the Denton Program, to Nicaragua in July, 2020. At MSP IAP Air Reserve Station, personnel from 27 APS prepared and help load some of the equipment travelling to Nicaragua which included firefighting equipment, a fire truck, ambulances, furniture, sewing material, agricultural supplies and education material. Of particular note was the fabric included in the cargo which was prioritized for making masks and personal protective equipment in the fight against COVID-19. The Denton Program is an unfunded government program that allows non-government organizations to donate humanitarian aid for movement by the U.S. Air Force on training missions.
