EMBLEM



On a disc divided per pale, Sable and Azure, a dexter gauntlet assurgent from a cloud formation in base all Proper, grasping two arrows in saltire heads and shafts to dexter Or, flighted Gules, in chief a skeleton key fesswise wards to dexter Yellow, all within a narrow border Yellow. Attached above the disc, a Black scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "MAHPIYA

AKICITA" in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Black scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "28 AMXS" in Yellow letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The fist, representing the Squadron's roots in the Strategic Command, thrusting the two arrows above the clouds signifying bomb squadrons. The background divided blue and black denotes readiness to employ air power day or night. The gold key, a traditional symbol, represents the Squadron being the key to combat power.
