### **EMBLEM**



On a disc Vert, an American Bald Eagle traversed, stooping wings elevated and displayed Proper (body and wing feathers Sable) supporting a terrestrial globe Azure, land masses Or, and grasping with both feet, a lance bendwise point to chief Argent, all within a narrow border Black. Attached above the disc, a Gray scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "28TH LSS" in Black letters. Attached below the disc a Gray scroll edged with a narrow Black border and inscribed "WORLD CLASS SUPPORT" in Black letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air

Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The globe and green background represent the earth that we defend and refer to worldwide readiness for mobilization and support. The eagle supporting the globe symbolizes the world-class support provided by the unit. The lance represents the B-1B Lancer. The eagle has three tail feathers symbolizing the Air Forces' Core Values of: integrity first, service before self, and excellence in all we do. Black symbolizes the stealth of the B-1B and serves as a remembrance of our POW/MIAs. Gray scrolls symbolize the Squadron's color. (Approved, 2001)
