EMBLEM

On a disc Celeste, a globe nebuly gored to the sinister, Azure and Or, charged with a delta Sable, soaring with a contrail Argent overall flanked by a pair of lightening bolts of the third, all within a narrow border Yellow. Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "FIDE ET FORTITUDINE" in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "28TH MISSION SUPPORT SQUADRON" in Yellow letters. SIGNIFICANCE: Ultramarine Blue and Air Force Yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The lightening bolts symbolize the Wing's mission of deploying power from the air, while the nebuly partition represents clouds, denoting the Wing's area of operation within the Air Force's Global Reach. The aircraft is a symbol of how the Squadron enables the rapid global employment of air power by ensuring combat-ready personnel through support of the warfighter and his/her family. The globe encompasses the ability of the Squadron to support Air Force contingencies worldwide. All the elements combined, including the motto, signify the Air Force's core values and indicate the determination and commitment to accomplish the mission.
