## **EMBLEM**





On a disc per saltire blue and gold within a narrow gold border a red disc rayonne emitting three red lightning flashes in pairle throughout charged with an Air Force award symbol, five white flight symbols converging surmounted The emblem is symbolic of the squadron. Against the blue which depicts the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations, the stars allude to the SAC banner and their number - two and eight - indicate the unit's numerical designation. The blue and gold division of the field suggests day and night and symbolizes the unit's motto "READY DAY OR NIGHT". The lightning, symbolizing speed and striking power; and the flaming red disc, symbolizing nuclear propulsion; represents the Squadron's munitions maintenance function. The

Air Force award symbol denotes the Squadron's Air force Outstanding Unit Award received for outstanding service. The emblem bears the National colors and the Air Force colors golden yellow and ultramarine blue. (Approved, 2 May 1967)

#### **OPERATIONS**

B-1 bombers from Ellsworth AFB, S.D., displayed their versatility in the maritime role by dropping sea mines over Pacific Coast training ranges in a series of drills in early June. Personnel from Naval Munitions Command Seal Beach, Calif., assembled the Mk-62 and Mk-65 Quick Strike mines, which airmen from the 28th Munitions Squadron then loaded on the bombers. "You don't want to have to be in a situation where you have to deploy mines, but if the threat is there, you want to know you and everyone you are working with knows what they're doing," said Navy minesman Petty Officer 1st Class Jeremy Frick. "We worked really well with the airmen who took part in this build," he added. The interoperability exercise was the first time Ellsworth's B-1s flew mining sorties in several years. 2014
