29 Mobile Aerial Port Squadron emblem

On a disc divided vertically, left side black with a white cloud emitting three yellow lightning bolts one up and two down, between one yellow star above and two yellow stars below; right side blue with a white cloud; overall a yellow package suspended by a white parachute below a white airplane and above fleshtone hand issuant from base, all within narrow yellow border. Attached above the disc white scroll bordered yellow and attached below the disc a white scroll inscribed "ANYTHING-ANYWHERE" in red letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** The background colors, the lightning bolt, and clouds are symbolic of the squadron's readiness in day, night, good or bad weather. The upheld hand refers to any unit or group of people in the world needing the unit's services. The aircraft alludes to Air Force cargo aircraft. The yellow border symbolizes excellence of the personnel of the squadron. The red letters are representative of aerial ports throughout the world.

29 Aerial Port Flight emblem: On a disc per pale Sable and Azure, in dexter chief a cloud formation Argent, emitting a lightning flash to dexter base Or, issuing from base a dexter hand supporting a rectangular container all Proper, all within a narrow border Yellow. Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "ANYTHING --

ANYWHERE" in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "29TH AERIAL PORT FLT" in Yellow letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The divided background represents the unit's day and night operations and twenty-four hour mission support capability. The cloud symbolizes purity of purpose and flight mission. The lightning flash signifies the quick response capability to mission requirements. The open hand represents the skilled efforts of unit personnel and the willingness to provide aerial port support. The hand holds a container signifying the primary mission of providing load support for the host wing. (Approved, 4 Mar 2003)
