### **OPERATIONS**

2054 Communications Squadron largest communications squadron in Air Training Communications Division (ATDC), has second largest radar approach control facility in air force, and includes second largest Base Communications Center (BSS) in ATCD. Provides communications computer operations, communications electronics, meteorological navigation aids maintenance, and air traffic services in support of Sheppard AFB. Bcc improved operational efficiency by eliminating use

of computer cards and providing timely Automated Data Systems and electrical message processing, established training program to train bcc operators on s1100/63 and standard remote terminals, and developed projects to enhance base level computer service capabilities.

After negotiations with Federal Aviation Administration officials, air traffic controllers from squadron completed necessary actions for implementation of Dallas/Fort Worth Metroplex Air Traffic System plan which developed new departure and arrival routes, established new airway and rerouted another. Squadron tasked to support department of defense exercise Joint Task Force Bravo In Honduras.

Expiration of air training command multiuser computer maintenance contract created host of problems for users. Squadron continued tradition of providing superb air traffic control, data processing, and communications/electronics maintenance for Sheppard AFB. Work-centers consolidated and 2054 CS major command shifted from Air Force Communications Command To Air Training Command, 1 oct 90.

Squadron saw period of adjustment with arrival of new commander Maj Billy D. Palmertree and redesignation from 2054 cs to 3750 cs. Host automated message system equipment software installed, tested and implemented. High volume air conditioning installation completed for bcc. Radar Approach Control and control towers had Flight Input/Output system installed.

Radar work center replaced faulty 1p-1017 Brite radar monitor improving tower controllers' ability to identify aircraft and issue traffic advisories.
