| <b>OPERATIONS</b> World War II fostered the return of flying training to Chanute Field, the first since 1918. The 29 Specialized Pilot Training Group, a unit of the Eastern Flying Training Command, Maxwell Field, began four-engine flying instruction at Chanute in September 1943. Initially, the flying training |

was on the B-17 Flying Fortress, but it was replaced by the older B-25 in the spring of 1944.

| The 29th was inactivated and the 2112 AAF Base Unit was activated and placed under Chanute's command. In September 1944, the 2112 transferred to Courtland, Alabama. That terminated fixed-wing flying training at Chanute Field, although some proficiency flying for those who had already earned their wings continued until 1971. |
