### **EMBLEM**

The three stars represent the three branches within the organization: administration, operations, and maintenance. The large red lightning bolt on the field of yellow signifies the professional excellence of the squadron personnel in providing rapid and reliable communications support. The double axe, set on a field of ultramarine blue, has a dual significance. It is a symbol of the ancient Minoan civilization of Crete and well represents the squadron's geographical location. It also symbolizes the 2115<sup>th</sup> Communications Squadron's TROPO Microwave Antenna.
