#### **EMBLEM**

The mythological griffin represents the United States Air Force (eagle head and wings) in the United Kingdom (body of the lion). The globe suspended by the griffin represents worldwide communications provided by the Air Force Communications Command. The key supporting the griffin represents the key element (Reed Capsule) that activated Europe's first electronic automatic voice network switch, located at Royal Air Force, Uxbridge, on 14 July 1969. The eight white stars represent the eight Defense Communications Agency microwave radio relay stations that are owned and maintained by the 2119 Communications Squadron. The colors, ultramarine blue and golden yellow, are the official United States Air Force colors.
