## **EMBLEM**

The two white darts are symbolic of the aircraft and teamwork which the squadron supports in its mission. The direct lightning bolts to the darts represent the positive command and control communications and air traffic control services which are provided. The larger curved lightning bolts symbolize the total communications and navigational aids efforts of the unit: to provide all-encompassing support within the unit's dynamic areas of responsibility. The blue and white globe superimposed with a sword symbolizes defense and is topped with the North Star representing a commitment to provide positive guidance and communications in order to ensure the strengths of United States Air Force's worldwide operational interests. The dark blue cloud looming above the horizon at the top symbolizes the ever present threat to the security and readiness of United States Armed Forces. The two white darts symbolically supported by squadron's capabilities and efforts, stand ready to meet this threat by helping to project American airpower whenever required.
