The squadron also prepares and executes all host base support for Guardian Challenge competition as well as the Guardian Tiger and Guardian Sword readiness programs for space and missile forces.

EMBLEM







On an ultramarine disc, the upper third of a Brittany azure globe, highlighted with ultramarine azure longitude and latitude lines, is positioned at middle base. An argent deltoid, followed by an or contrail, emerges from behind the globe and encircles the disc from sinister base to middle chief. An argent sword hilted brown is surmounted over the globe from sinister base to dexter chief. Two parallel radar sweeps emerge also from behind the globe and encircle the disc from sinister base to sinister chief, disappearing behind the blade of the sword. The disc is bordered with ultramarine azure. An or scroll, which is blank, is attached below the disc. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The gray deltoid links the unit to its parent command, the Air Force Space Command. The contrail flowing from the deltoid links the unit to the 30th Space Wing's spacelift mission. It also represents the aeronautical and launch related employments provided by the unit. The Brittany blue globe depicts the worldwide impact of the unit employments on spacelift operations. The sword denotes our unit's integrity and decisive responsiveness in the use of airfield operations, training, intelligence, and conduct of space and missile presentations, Guardian exercises and competitions, and missile heritage. The two radar scope sweeps represent constant vigilance exerted by various functions of the unit. (Approved, 12 Sep 1994)
