### **EMBLEM**



45 Aeromedical Evacuation Squadron constituted emblem: On a blue disc edged yellow, between 4 yellow five pointed stars, 2 and 2, in upper left a white globe with land masses outlined in

black and with black grid lines, a yellow chain encircling the globe diagonally, and in lower right and partially extending over the globe, a red cross edged white and bearing a white silhouette of an aeromedical evacuation aircraft surmounted vertically by a white staff of Aesculapius, a white lightning flash issuing from each of the lower edges of the horizontal arms of the cross and a white lightning flash conjoining the right edge of the upper vertical arm of the cross. **SIGNIFICANCE:** The blue background represents the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations, the Red Cross, aeromedical evacuation aircraft and staff of Aesculapius, the international mercy mission aspects of the squadron, the globe encircled by the chain signifying its world-wide evacuation activities and the stars and lightning flashes the basic Air Force mission and operations. 45 Aeromedical Evacuation Flight





On a disc bendwise sinister Azure and Celeste, a lightning bolt Or surmounting a contrail emitting from base palewise Argent; in dexter a pair of flight wings elevated and addorsed bearing a cross Gules and issuant from base two contrails arced to dexter and sinister chief; all within a narrow border Yellow. Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed “DELIVERING AMERICA’S PROMISE” in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed “45 AEROMEDICAL EVACUATION SQ” in Yellow letters. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The flight wings and cross represent the Squadron’s aeromedical humanitarian and wartime mission. The contrails symbolize the unit’s air superiority in homeland defense, humanitarian missions, and aeromedical evacuations worldwide. The lightning bolt refers to the Squadron’s high level of commitment to the mission and the United States Air Force. (Approved, 15 Sep 2008)
