The 46 Aerial Port Squadron deploys trained personnel and equipment to provide augmentation or stand-alone port support at aerial ports of embarkation and aerial ports of debarkation or unit move on and unload locations. Responsibilities include cargo and passenger processing, aircraft loading and unloading, joint inspection, mobility load team supervision, engine running on and unload, home station and deployed Air Terminal Operations Center and Contingency Response Element, Tactical Control Unit, Departure Airfield Control Group operations.

EMBLEM





46 Aerial Port Squadron emblem: An ultramarine azure disc, with a fimbriated or border, a brown American Eagle rendered with an or beak, carries in its or talons, or lines extending to the sable netted brown pallet lined in or. The eagle, with argent head and argent tail, is superimposed over a silver argent bordered vert sphere with ultramarine azure longitude and latitude lines. On the dexter side of the disc is an or lightning bolt and on the sinister side of the disc a vert olive branch. **SIGNIFICANCE:** Ultramarine azure and or are the Air Force colors. Azure alludes to the sky, the primary theatre of Air Force operations. Or refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The American Bald Eagle, our national bird represents the close association with the active duty Eagle Wing. The netted pallet symbolizes the primary mission of providing airlift support. In the background a sphere with longitude and latitude lines indicates our units global support of the Air Force mission during war, represented by the yellow lightning bolt on the dexter side and during peace, represented by the green olive branch on the sinister side.
