Under the 3310 TTW were four groups; 3310th Air Base Group, 3310th Technical Training Group, 3310th Maintenance and Supply Group, and 3310th Station Hospital.

Francis E. Warren and Scott End Training

Training ended at Francis E. Warren on 24 March 1959, but it was 1 May before ATC discontinued its 3450th Technical Training Group. At Scott the last students graduated in late February, and ATC inactivated the 3310th Technical Training Group.

1 July — 30 September 1948

The reorganization of the 3505th AF Base Unit to the 3310th Technical Training Wing and subordinate Table of Distribution Units, effective 26 August 1948 was accomplished without excessive difficulty despite the administrative load involved. Gen. Kiel became commander of the Wing as

well as of Scott Air Force Base 26 Aug. 1948. Directly under the Wing Commander are the Executive Officer, Public Information Officer, Inspector General, Air Inspector, Air Provost Marshal and the Hq. and Hq. Sq., consisting of the wing staff and the personnel.

Within the wing are 4 groups; 3310th Air Base Group, 3310th Technical Training Group, 3310th Maintenance and Supply Group, and 3310th Station Hospital, under each of which appropriate squadrons are established. At each level functional responsibility is combined with administrative responsibility.

Definite advantages due to the reorganization accrued to maintenance and supply in that all personnel connected with such activities were grouped in separate squadrons directly under the command jurisdiction of the 3310th Maintenance and Supple Group. Whereas such personnel formerly were scattered in various squadrons throughout the field, they now come under one group commander in unified organizations readily accessible by reason of their physical proximity. This arrangement greatly facilitates proper discipline, enables more precise selections for promotions and brings about a smoother attainment of the mission of the group.
