### **EMBLEM**



7 Munitions Maintenance Squadron emblem



7 Munitions Squadron emblem: On a disc Azure, a missile Argent and an aerial bomb Vert in saltire points upward, between four White mullets. Overall a bomb Sable, enflamed Proper, all within a narrow bordure Yellow. Attached above the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "7 MUNITIONS SQUADRON" in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Blue scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "ANYTIME ANYPLACE" in Yellow letters. SIGNIFICANCE: Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The stars, representing the four corners of the globe, symbolize

worldwide munitions support. The two missile bombs indicate both guided and unguided weaponry. The ignited bomb is the time-honored emblem always connected to explosives and serves as a link to the past. It also emphasizes that even as weapon systems modernize, the important role of ordnance personnel remains crucial and unchanged. (Approved, 16 Jul 2001)
