EMBLEM



68 Bombardment Squadron, Medium emblem: On a shield sky blue, between a cross red, edged white, in the two upper quarters, six bombs, points downward, three on each side of the cross, white, shaded blue; in the two lower quarters, eight stars, four on each side of the cross, white, in base over the cross a sphere, white, markings blue, over the center of the cross a star white, thereover an eagle flying blue, markings white. **BLAZON:** On shield azure, between a cross gules, fimbriated argent, in the first and second quarters, six bombs, three and three, chevron wise reversed, argent, shaded azure; in the third and fourth quarter, eight stars, four and four, argent; surmounting the center of the cross, a star argent, thereon an eagle volant azure, nark logs argent, surmounting the crocs in base a sphere ardent, markings azure. The design will face to the front when used on aircraft. **SIGNIFICANCE:** The field of tie shield is blue far the sky. The cross is similar to that which Crusaders used during the Holy Wars as a token that Cod's help could never fall them. The red is the color adopted by the squadron. The blue is for the sky where the true mission awaits fulfillment. The eagle Is a symbol of flight, wings over the world, and guardian of world peace. The boobs allude to the mission of a bombardment squadron. There are six of them, and eight stars, which refer to the numerical designation of the unit.

68th Strategic Missile Squadron (ICBM-Minuteman) emblem: On an AF disc azure, in central and prominent position, an American eagle, displayed proper, is clutching in his talons a thunderbolt or fesswise throughout flanked on either side by missiles gules, highlighted of the second depicted in a blue sky, converging toward base beneath the red missiles eight red dart-shaped vehicles pointed downward; issuant from base a demi-globe checky of the second and

sanguine; over the eagle in chief semi- circular six eight-pointed stars blue. **SIGNIFICANCE:** The emblem is symbolic of the squadron and its mission. Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The emblem is symbolic of the squadron and its mission. Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The missiles represent the function of a missile squadron and the dart-shaped vehicles represent reentering missile warheads. The six stars and the eight vehicles refer to the numerical designation of the unit. The eagle is a symbol of flight and guardian of world peace. The lightning bolts represent the control exerted over missiles by the airborne launch control system (ALCS) and allude to a function of the unit. (Approved, 31 Dec 1968)
