EMBLEM



On a blue disc, a knight in armor grasping a torch in his right hand riding a rampant Pegasus, all

yellow detailed gold brown and on a white demiglobe grid lined blue issuing from base all between seven yellow stars arcing in dexter and two stars arcing in sinister; all within a narrow yellow border. Attached below the disc a blue scroll edged with a narrow yellow border. SIGNIFICANCE: the winged horse is representative of the flying mission of the unit. The knight, a device used by the previous, inactivated, parent unit, symbolizes the support function of the unit. The torch of knowledge indicates the importance of training to serve. The nine stars, seven left and two right, indicate the squadron's numerical designation. The globe acknowledges the unit's worldwide mission. Ultramarine blue and air force yellow are the air force colors. The blue of the field, lines of latitude and longitude on the globe, and lettering on the scroll, represent the sky, the primary theatre of air force operations. The yellow of the stars, narrow border, edge of scroll, horse, knight and torch refers to the sun and the excellence required of air force personnel. Gold brown is used to outline the central figure and to provide detail to the horse, knight and torch. White provides the background for the scroll and globe. OPERATIONS

Airborne assaults on Normandy, Holland, and Germany; relief of Bastogne; aerial transportation of passengers and cargo in ETO during World War II.

Troop carrier and transport duties, 1947-1969; forward air control training, 1969-1971; special operations training, 1971-1973; and worldwide air refueling missions since 1973.

Personnel and aircraft deployed to Saudi Arabia during the Gulf War, performing air refueling duties for allied forces, Aug 1990-Mar 1991 and periodically deployed since late 1993 to Italy and other western European locations in support of NATO operations over Bosnia.
