88 Comptroller Squadron emblem: On a disc Argent, three pallets Gules, a chief enhanced Azure charged with three mullets fesswise of the first, issuing from base a terrestrial demi-globe Proper, overall at fess point an eagle volant Proper, and at base a money bag White, retorted with a tie Brown and garnished with a dollar sign Vert, all within a narrow border Yellow. Attached above the disc, a Red scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "NO MONEY NO MISSION" in Yellow letters. Attached below the disc, a Red scroll edged with a narrow Yellow border and inscribed "88TH COMPTROLLER SQUADRON" in Yellow letters. **SIGNIFICANCE**: Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The three stars and stripes are symbolic of the unit's vision of professional, expeditionary and world-class financial managers and denote their core values of country, family and freedom. The eagle alludes to the faith and duty of a total military and civilian force dedicated to accomplishing the Air Force mission. The globe and money bag stand for the Squadron's profession of a combat comptroller and their commitment to world-class customer service.
