EMBLEM



1776th Civil Engineering Squadron emblem: Blue and yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and excellence required of Air Force personnel. The shovel, saw and hammer represent the repair and maintenance functions of the squadron. The fire hat, axe and bugle suggest the unit's fire protection duties. The T-square and triangle reflect the engineering duties of the squadron. The aircraft refers to the unit's support to special air missions and presidential aircraft. The stars refer to the original thirteen states. (Approved, 22 May 1990)
