EMBLEM



Azure, a triangle celeste issuant at base corners with clouds argent, within a border or charged at dexter with three mullets white and to sinister of the like, overall, a bald eagle proper stooping, grasping in its dexter talon a wrench and screwdriver saltirewise sable and in its sinister talon a bomb of the last enflamed bendwise sinister gules; all within a diminished bordure black.

SIGNIFICANCE: The emblem is symbolic of the squadron and its mission. Ultramarine blue and Air Force yellow are the Air Force colors. Blue alludes to the sky, the primary theater of Air Force operations. Yellow refers to the sun and the excellence required of Air Force personnel. The first set of stars symbolizes the three previous units which were consolidated to form the present squadron. The second set of stars signifies the unit's membership as part of the nation's nuclear triad. The bald eagle reflects the unit members' loyalty, patriotism and determination to provide the best maintenance service. The eagle grasps tools and a bomb indicating its mission taskings.

90 Maintenance Squadron emblem

Approved, 3 May 1956; newest rendition approved, 19 Mar 1997.

90th Missile Maintenance Squadron emblem: On a disc, azure, between three mullets or, on a plate nebuly three arrowheads, one in chief and two in base, points inward counterchanged, all within a narrow bordure of the first. Below a blank scroll azure edged or. **SIGNIFICANCE:** The emblem is symbolic of the squadron and its mission. The gold stars and blue background represent the high ideals of the Air Force and the sky. The flight symbols half light and half dark refer to the day and night strategic alertness of the 90th Missile Maintenance Squadron. The nebuly refers to the continuous maintenance capabilities of the unit. The three sections of the disc represent the three states, Wyoming, Nebraska, and Colorado, where the maintenance actions are performed. (Approved, 9 Aug 1967)
